Hon. Bruce A. Spanner Receives Outstanding Judge Award

Benton Franklin Counties Superior Court Judge acknowledged for contribution to the courts.

He has served as chair of the Technology Committee for the Washington State Superior Court Judges' Association and spearheaded the committee's project to replace the statewide case management software. He revamped the local court's website to host all of the information necessary for litigation before the local bench, and expended a great deal of effort to commemorate the history of the southeastern Washington judiciary by including the "History of the Judicial District," which includes historical context dating back to the late 19th century.

"The members of this bench have benefitted from many of the innovations that have been put in place by Judge Spanner, and many policies and procedures that make us a more efficient court," said Benton Franklin Counties Superior Court Judge Alex Ekstrom.
